## Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy receives grants from The Brown and Cullen Foundations

As part of a \$12 million capital campaign to improve the Willow Waterhole Greenway, The Brown Foundation, Inc. awarded a \$1.5 million grant in May and The Cullen Foundation awarded a \$1.0 million grant in June to the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy.

In November 2021, the Kinder Foundation made a gift of \$2 million to the campaigns with a commitment to match an additional \$2 million on a dollar-for-dollar basis. With the match, the cumulative total from the three foundations equals \$6.5 million.

The capital campaign will fund construction of eight miles of trails around the six Willow Waterhole lakes, additional parking, construction of a pier, purchasing of additional acreage, and developing a 15-acre native coastal prairie where endangered plants have been identified.

Connections will also be added to the Greenway hike and bike system via easements. Construction on the trails will begin this year and go through 2023.

"We are incredibly grateful to the foundations for these monumental gifts. The Greenway is a refuge for all Houstonians and their support will help transform the Greenway," said Bill Burhans, the Conservancy's president.

## The pier is "near-er:" Watch a video rendering of the new pier design and location

In the spring 2022 issue of *The Watering Hole,* we discussed the fundraising for the Westbury Lake Recreational Pier. Today, we can finally state that the pier is "near-er."

In early June, bids for the pier were accepted and we are pleased to announce a contract has been awarded. Millis Development & Construction Inc., Missouri City, TX was awarded the construction contract for the pier as designed by Cobb Fendley & Associates Inc., Houston, TX.

The Pier will extend 46 feet into Westbury Lake, make a 90 degree turn toward the Westbury Little League facility and then extend another 32 feet. The walkway will be 8 feet wide, and the entire structure will be enclosed with a safety railing.

Construction should begin in late July with an estimated completion time of four months. Thank you to all those who funded this fantastic and much anticipated addition to the park.

## Dabney Kennedy's impact on Willow Waterhole Greenway

Our dear friend Dabney Kennedy passed away in June. In remembrance of him, we're sharing about his impact on the Willow Waterhole.

From 1997 to 2000, as President of the Westbury Civic Club, Dabney was a leading advocate for a stormwater detention facility to be built at the current site. He was also the main voice on the Project Brays Citizen Advisory Committee lobbying the Harris County Flood Control District for a landscape architectural design.

Additionally, Dabney was chairman of the Brays Bayou Association's committee that set up the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy in 2001 and served as the Conservancy's first vice president. He was its chief fundraiser for over a decade raising over \$100,000.

HCFCD's design manual at the time called for detention basins to be designed as fenced-in rectangular holes in the ground. Dabney's mantra was: "Westbury does not want a hole in the ground with a fence around it". Because of this, the BBA commissioned landscape architect, Kevin Shanley, and he created the design with curvilinear shorelines, islands, and elevation changes as seen today.

Dabney was the main contact with the management at the Shell Gasmer Research Facility, which led to nine annual \$10,000 Shell Oil grants over the years.

In honor of his love for Willow Waterhole, his family requested that donations in his memory be made to the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy.

## Join Willow Waterhole for the dedication of a new Naturescape Sculpture on July 16

Ann Lee was a founding member of the Brays Bayou Association and its first president. The BBA was established in 1984 by a group of residents from Southwest Houston (Ann is a Maplewood resident) with a goal of reducing flooding in the Brays Bayou Watershed.

Their efforts led to the \$500 million Project Brays funded by the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers that has resulted in many improvements completed by the Harris County Flood Control District over twenty-five years.

The \$75 million Willow Waterhole stormwater detention facility was among the improvements. Project Brays will be completed in 2022 with the completion of several new bridges over the Bayou.

Thirty-eight years after the BBA was founded, it is time that we honor Ann Lee for her invaluable contributions. Two donors provided funds for a new Naturescape sculpture made in her honor.

## Levitt Pavilion Houston/Gasmer Redevelopment to become "Energy Capital Park"

The Friends of Levitt Pavilion Houston (FOLPH) Design Committee has worked closely with Studio RED Architects to develop the latest renderings.

Located on three acres, Levitt Pavilion Houston will feature 40 free, professional, and diverse musical concerts annually with seating capacity for 5,000.

Next steps are final design, budgeting, and launch of the capital fundraising campaign.

Located on the 29-acre site of the former Shell Oil Technology Center and next to the Willow Waterhole Greenway, the Pavilion will be part of a transformative community redevelopment project. Brays Oaks Management District leads the master planning phase, per site owner, City of Houston's request.

The property contains oilfield structures used by Shell since the 1950s to test processes and train employees. Nowhere else are so many different energy related structures contained on one small site.

The facility will be repurposed to become Energy Capital Park, further showcasing Houston's position as the energy capital of the world. Besides Levitt Pavilion, there will be a community center, performance theater, artist workshops, an oil industry museum, a café, outdoor movie viewing, children's playground, and ample restrooms and parking.



### **Board member profile: Barbara Richards**

Barbara was born and raised in Concord, New Hampshire. She moved to Houston in 1977, lived in Westbury for twenty years and now resides in Braeburn Valley with her husband, Robert, and dog, Brandi. She retired from MD Anderson Center in 2013 and is an active member of the MD Anderson Retiree Association.

### Getting to know the trees of Willow Waterhole: Loblolly Pine

As you walk around Willow Waterhole, you will see multiple loblolly pines.

The loblolly pine (Pinus taeda) is a large, fast-growing tree, reaching heights of 125 feet and a trunk up to four feet in diameter, with a dense, rounded crown of dark, blue-green foliage.

The needles are borne in bundles of 3, mostly 5 to 10 inches long. In the spring, bright green clumps of needles grow at the end of branches and give the tree a luxuriant appearance.


Male conelets are yellow-green to purple, about 2 inches long, appearing in spring at the tips of branchlets. They produce the pollen which is carried by the wind to the female cones.

The fruit is the woody, female cone, 3 to 5 inches long, oval, reddish brown, armed with prickles on the tips of the scales. They require two years to mature. The winged seeds are shed during the fall and early winter after the cones fully open.

The resinous wood is coarse-grained and there is a marked contrast between the bands of springwood and summerwood.

The name "loblolly" comes from a slang word used by English seamen for the lumpy gruel they were served at sea. The term came to be associated with the baygalls and wet areas in the low country of the Carolinas where the first settlers arrived in the 1600's.

#### **April 2022**

### **Furthering Your Support**

Spporters of Willow Waterhole may have several options to increase the impact of their gifts. Multiply your gift to WWGC through programs offered by your employer!



#### **Employer matching programs**

Employer programs may match your contribution to 501(c)3 non-profits, many dollar for dollar. Your employer (or former employer if a retiree) may provide a link to a website where you record your donations.

Your contribution may be verified with Willow Waterhole by the employer prior to being matched. Program requirements will vary. For example, if your spouse is the employee/retiree the contribution might need to be in their name.



#### **Employee volunteer hours and grants**

Some employers recognize the positive impact to the community when their employees volunteer at 501(c)3 nonprofits. In recognition, some employers provide paid philanthropy days while other employers offer cash grants or donations directly to the nonprofit after the employee volunteers a certain number of hours annually.

Typically, the hours are self-reported by the employee on the employer-sponsored website. We have seen programs where volunteering 20 hours generates a grant of \$500 for Willow Waterhole!


